Stanfield, in a 1934 Roush Racing Ford Indy racer, scored an incredible 1.52 seconds off a perfect score of zero with rookie navigator Andy Massimilla of Stratham, NH. In the fiercely competitive \$275,000 transcontinental rally-race, only three seconds separated the winners from two-time champions Rex Gardner of Stilwell, KS and Gary Kuck of Lincoln, NB, in the Carquest 1917 Hudson racer at 1.55 seconds.
